

Biographical data on the Albert family, Saarbrücken, later Carrières-sur-Seine, France

Julius Albert, born August 3, 1871, in Ottweiler

His parents were: **Aaron Albert**, born September 13, 1834, in Ottweiler, occupation: wine merchant, and **Johannette, née Feiß** (26 years old at the time of Julius' birth). Their biographical data can no longer be found in Ottweiler. Julius was probably the couple's only child.

The date of his departure from Ottweiler is unknown. The Saarbrücken registration records (information from the city archives) show that Julius Albert changed his place of residence within Saarbrücken on February 1, 1903 (from Johannesstraße 9 to Dudweilerstr. 4). He must therefore have been living in Saarbrücken before 1903. Later addresses in Saarbrücken are: Sulzbachstraße 5, Bahnhofstraße 65, and Sulzbachstraße 4.

Mr. Albert ran a leather business in Saarbrücken. Before his marriage to Martha Hammel, Mr. Albert had already been married once. He had (at least) one son from his first marriage, named **Arnold**, (* June 5, 1905 in Saarbrücken), who lived in Rio de Janeiro during the Nazi era.

When Julius Albert married Martha Hammel (on December 4, 1923 in Göppingen), he was a widower. The name and dates of birth and death of his first wife are unknown.

Martha Albert, née Hammel, born on August 4, 1893, in Strasbourg (then part of the German Empire)

After World War I, the Hammel family moved to Germany.

Her parents were: **Bernhard Hammel** (died 1905) and **Friederike**, née Fleischer, born in 1858, who had grown up in Göppingen.

Martha had three siblings:

Alfred Hammel, who was married and lived in Frankfurt am Main, was murdered by one of his employees in 1929. He had a son, **Bernhard**, born in 1922, who emigrated to the USA and took the surname 'Hall'.

Siegmund Hammel, who is said to have been slightly mentally disabled, died without issue before 1935.

Paula Hammel, born on June 19, 1885, in Strasbourg, later married her cousin Arthur Fleischer from Göppingen. The history of this family can be read on the website www.stolpersteine-gp.de. The relatives who are still alive today also come from this family.

It is not yet known when Martha Hammel moved away from Strasbourg, but it was probably at the end of World War I. In any case, she was registered in Göppingen from October 4, 1921, at the address of her sister **Paula Fleischer**, Nördliche Ringstr. 33. Her occupation is listed as "teacher." It has not been possible to ascertain whether she taught in Göppingen.

Shortly after her marriage to **Julius Albert** on December 4, 1923, in Göppingen, she moved with her husband to Saarbrücken, Sulzbachstr. 4, on December 10, 1923. It remains unclear whether she worked as a teacher in Saarbrücken or was involved in the leather business.

On May 11, 1925, Martha and Julius's first and only child was born in Saarbrücken: **Friederike Jeanette Albert** (seen on the right in the photo as a child).

Lilo Guggenheim-Levine, a relative of about the same age, remembered that Friederike had been "very pious."

On December 24, 1935, the family moved to Carrières-sur-Seine, near Paris, France. Their address was 41 Rue Victor Hugo.

According to **Ehut (Erwin) Fleischer**, a cousin of Friederike's who visited the family several times in 1940, the Alberts lived off their savings in France (Julius Albert was already of retirement age).

July 1942	Internment in the Paris cycling arena 'Velodrom d'Hiver'
(?)	Admission to the Drancy camp
November 6, 1942	Deportation from Drancy to Auschwitz concentration camp. Murder of the family.
